



Course Description	American Sign Language (ASL) is a manual language which entails vocabulary, grammar, sentence structure as well as body movement to express meaning for communication. ASL III will build upon ASL II with units including cultural aspects to help students understand and interact with the Deaf. Lessons are structured around language needed for common life situations.
